WHAT IS SDMP?



Stands for Social Development and Management Program

-“the sustained improvement in the living standards of the host and neighboring communities by creating responsible, self-reliant and resource-based communities capable of developing, implementing and managing community development programs, projects, and activities in a manner consistent with the principle of people empowerment.

SDMP LEGAL BASIS

DAO 2010-21, Section 134

The Contractor/Permit Holder/Lessee shall allot annually a minimum of one and a half percent (1.50%) of the operating costs necessary to implement SDMP.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE HOST AND NEIGHBORING COMMUNITIES (DHNC)
= 75%

PROMOTION OF PUBLIC AWARENESS AND EDUCATION ON MINING TECHNOLOGY AND GEOSCIENCES (IEC)= 15%

DEVELOPMENT OF MINING TECHNOLOGY AND GEOSCIENCES (DMTG)=10%

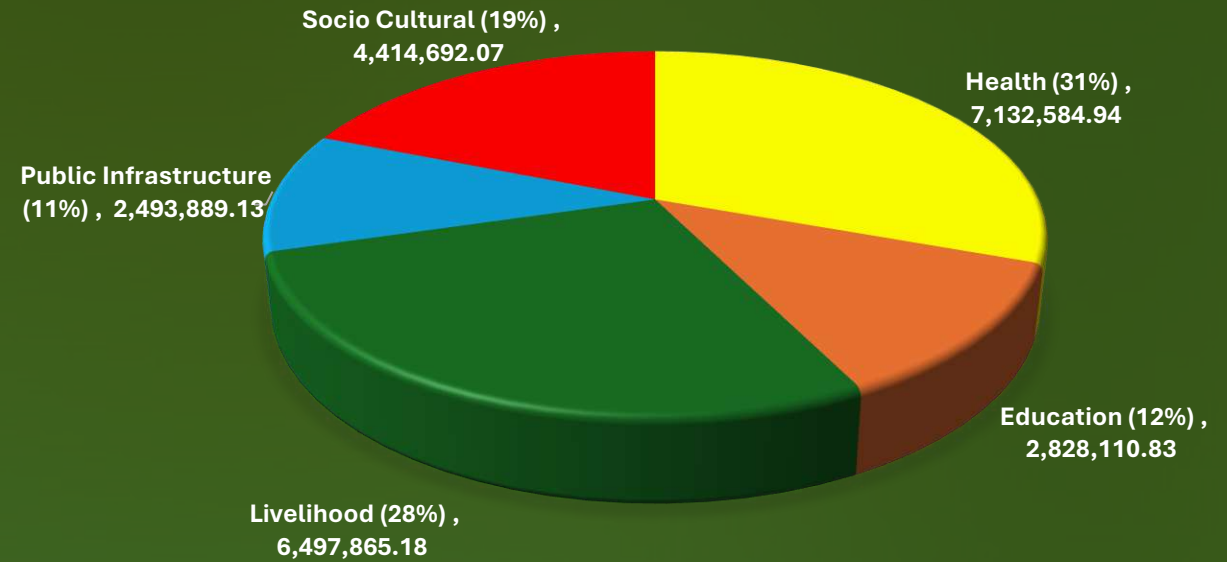
